This descriptive inventory was compiled by Marion R. Hemperley of the Georgia Surveyor General Department, Atlanta, now the Georgia Archives. In addition to the preparation of this inventory, he completely sorted and cataloged the Goff Collection: In February, 1967, when Dr. Goff knew of his impending death, he presented his entire collection to the Surveyor General Department and gave detailed instructions to the author on how to file his papers maps, etc. These instructions were followed and all his maps, loose manuscript papers, and prints were cataloged or filed just as he had instructed. To make this collection available to all interested persons, it was deemed necessary to compile this descriptive inventory as the end result of the cataloging and filing. After the accessioning of this collection, Series One through Nine, the maps, were interfiled into the general collection of the Surveyor General Department, which then became known as the State Land Records Section in the late 1980's. At this time Eva Bufford typed the folder list for Series Ten that appears in this inventory.

In August 1990 Series Ten through Thirteen were transferred to the Manuscripts Section, accessioning records were created to give the collection a number (ac 67-604), and a location list was made.

Although this inventory describes the entire John Goff Collection, it services only Series Ten through Thirteen.

INTRODUCTION

John Hedges Goff was born at Jackson, Kentucky, on February 21, 1899. After spending his youth on his grandfather's farm in Winchester County, Kentucky, and for a time in Mississippi, John Goff moved to Georgia while still in his teens. After graduating from Oglethorpe University in 1919, he attended the University of Paris, University of Strasbourg (France), and Centro de Cursos Historicos (Madrid, Spain). In 1929, he received his Ph.D from Georgetown University School of Foreign Service, Washington, D. C. Upon graduation, Dr. Goff taught at a number of colleges and universities, including Mississippi State College, Starkville; Georgia Institute of Technology, Atlanta; Armstrong College, Berkeley, California; Auburn University, Auburn, Alabama; and Emory University, Atlanta. He was Acting Dean of the School of Business Administration at the latter institution upon his retirement in 1959.

In 1936-39, and again in 1942-44, Dr. Goff went on leave from Auburn University to serve as Director of the Transportation and Industrial Economics Division of the Tennessee Valley Authority. He served as consulting economist for the T.V.A. in Alabama and for the Bonneville Power Company, Portland, Oregon. During World War II, Dr. Goff was Chief Economist and Director of Research for the U.S. Transportation Board of Investigation and Research, Washington, D.C., under President Roosevelt.

In addition to many articles on place names and local history of the Southeast, Dr. Goff was author, coauthor, or director of several published reports on transportation and industrial economics. Dr. Goff was especially interested in the economic history of the early Southeast and wrote many papers in that field. His testimony played an influential part in the appraisal of Creek Nation lands in southern Georgia and southeastern Alabama in the suit which resulted in the U.S. Government paying over \$3,500,000 to the Creeks for territory they claimed had been underestimated in value at the time of the treaties.

Dr. Goff was associated with both the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Indian Claims Division of the U.S. Department of Justice. Dr. Goff was a founder member of the American Society of Traffic and Transportation, member of the Interstate Commerce Commission

Practitioners Association, and the Atlanta World Trade Council. He was chairman of both the Council and Atlanta Chapter, I.C.C. and a member of the Southern Economic Association, the American Economic Association, and the Georgia Historical Society. He was also a member of the Kappa Alpha Fraternity, Beta Gamma Sigma Fraternity, Omicron Delta Kappa Leadership Fraternity, and the Phi Kappa Phi Business Scholarship Fraternity.

For most of his adult life, Dr. Goff was interested in historical and place name studies of the Southeast, with an emphasis on those of Georgia. What started as a hobby became an avocation as time went on until, in 1959, he retired from teaching to devote full time to his historical interests. Dr. Goff researched for over thirty years in Georgia's original land records, plats of survey, and maps, on file today at the Georgia Archives. In addition, he supplemented his basic research at other institutions in various states surrounding Georgia, Washington, D. C., Chicago, and London.

About 1950, Dr. Goff received a grant from the Research Committee, Emory University, Atlanta, to trace a number of historic trails and highways across the South. The result of this grant was a series of excellent articles on the early road system and Indian trails of the Southeast and the addition of much pertinent data to his basic collection.

In September 1961, Dr. Goff received a grant to go to London in order to search out and have reproduced early maps of the Southeast for Emory University. He spent the entire fall and part of the winter in that city in his research and returned to Atlanta with a fine collection of maps heretofore unavailable in this area.

Some months prior to Dr. Goff's untimely death on September 7, 1967, he presented his entire collection of maps, notes, and prints to the Georgia Archives. This large collection is there for the use of historians, anthropologists, and geographers interested in research in the southeastern United States.

1. GEORGIA STATE HIGHWAY COUNTY ROAD MAPS. 1940-1967. 366 items.

This is a series of maps by the Georgia Highway Department showing the state's road system, cities and towns, streams, and geographical features as they existed at the time of publication. Miscellaneous copies of these maps were given to Dr. Goff throughout the years and he took them on his many trips over the state, making notes on them as he went along. This series of maps contains a large amount of historical information, annotated by Dr. Goff, pertaining to original Indian trails, early roads, old towns, and almost everything of an historical nature. They are especially useful in retracing the early road system of Georgia, since he indicated many of the old road names and locations. Completely covering Georgia's 159 counties, these maps are filed by geographical location, thence by county. A master index map which Dr. Goff prepared shows his particular filing system, a system which has been adhered to by the Archives.

2. U.S. TOPOGRAPHICAL QUADRANGLES COVERING GEORGIA. 1891-1964. 401 items.

This series of topographical maps by the Geological Survey, Washington, covers much of Georgia and sometimes small portions of adjoining states. They are regular 7 1/2, 15, and 30 minute quadrangle maps published by the Survey. As a rule, these maps have been marked by Dr. Goff with the routes of Indian trails, early roads, Indian towns, and many place names in which he was interested. They cover only a portion of Georgia and are filed alphabetically by

quadrangle name with a master index placed at the beginning of the series. Included are a few preliminary maps which have never been published.

3. ALABAMA MAPS. 1900-1953. 90 items.

This series of maps consists of the following: County Soil Maps, U.S. Department of Agriculture; State Highway Department County Road Maps; National Forest Maps, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Forest Service; and State of Alabama Maps by Alabama State Highway Department. The Alabama maps, especially those for east-central Alabama, show many Indian trails, early roads, Indian towns, and almost everything of historical interest. They should be consulted for those interested in the continuation of early roads and Indian trails westward from Georgia. They are filed alphabetically by county with the National Forest and state maps last. There is a detailed inventory filed with the maps.

4. VIRGINIA MAPS. 1892-1969. 5 items.

The following Virginia maps are on file: Fredericksburg, Virginia-Maryland, Topographical Quadrangle, 1894, reprinted 1944, and Spotsylvania, Virginia. Topographical Quadrangle, 1892, reprinted 1944, both by the U.S. Geological Survey; Spotsylvania County Highway Department Road Map, 1957; Base Map, State of Virginia, U.S. Geological Survey, 1957; Huntington Sectional Aeronautical Chart, U.S. Coast and Geodetic Survey, 1959. None of these maps have any historical date recorded on them by Dr. Goff.

5. TENNESSEE MAPS. 1895-1959. 35 items.

This series of maps consists of the following: Tennessee State Highway County Road Maps; County Soil Maps by U.S. Department of Agriculture; Official County Maps by various counties; Topographical Quadrangles and State of Tennessee Base Map, both by U.S. Geological Survey; and Corps of Engineers Maps of the Southeast by U.S. Army. These maps generally cover the area of eastern Tennessee and that portion adjoining Georgia. The Tennessee maps, especially those next to Georgia, show many Indian trails, Indian towns, early roads, and many other features of an historical nature. They are very good for the researcher who wants to continue the Georgia trails and roads northward into Tennessee. They are filed alphabetically by county with the topographical quadrangles and state base maps last. There is a detailed inventory filed with the maps.

6. NORTH CAROLINA MAPS. 1906-1949. 31 items.

The North Carolina series of maps consists of the following: County Soil Maps, U.S. Department of Agriculture; Highway Department Road Maps; Topographical Quadrangles and Base Map of North Carolina, both by the U.S. Geological Survey; and Nantahala National Forest, N.C., 1942, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Forest Service. This series of maps generally cover the area adjoining Georgia and have a limited amount of historical information on them. They are useful in tracing the Indian trails and early roads northward from Georgia and eastward from Tennessee. The North Carolina maps are filed alphabetically by county, with the topographical and state base maps last. There is a detailed inventory filed with the maps.

7. FLORIDA MAPS. 1913-1963. 27 items.

The Florida maps consists of the following: State Highway County Road Maps; County Soil Maps, U.S. Department of Agriculture; National Forest Maps, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Forest Service; Miccosukee, Florida, Topographical Quadrangle, 1963, U.S. Geological Survey; and Sectional State Maps, by Florida Department of Agriculture. This series of maps cover the area generally adjoining Georgia and shows a limited amount of historical data. Filed alphabetically by county, with National Forest and Sectional State Maps last. There is a detailed inventory filed with the maps.

8. SOUTH CAROLINA MAPS. 1907-1956. 21 items.

This series of maps consists of the following: State Highway Department County Road Maps; County Soil Maps, U.S. Department of Agriculture; National Forest Maps; U.S. Department of Agriculture, Forest Service; and State Base Maps and Topographical Quadrangles by the U.S. Geological Survey. The South Carolina maps cover the general area next to Georgia and supplement the latter state's early trails and road system. They should be consulted by researchers who wish to continue Indian trails and early roads eastward from Georgia into South Carolina. This series of maps contain a limited amount of historical data. They are filed alphabetically by county with the topographical quadrangles, state base maps, and National Forest maps last. There is a detailed inventory filed with the maps.

9. MISSISSIPPI MAPS. 1907-1956. 15 items.

The Mississippi maps consist of a random collection of state and county maps of the following types: County Soil Maps, U.S. Department of agriculture; National Forest Maps, U.S. Department of agriculture, Forest Service; and State Base Maps by the U.S. Geological Survey. These are isolated charts of selected areas. They contain no historical date by Dr. Goff. Filed alphabetically by county with the National Forest and state base maps last. There is a detailed inventory filed with the maps.

10. LOOSE MANUSCRIPT NOTES. 16 cu. ft.

This is the handwritten and typescript loose note file of the Goff papers and is the heart of the entire collection. It contains most of the information that he collected on almost every conceivable phase of local Southeastern history. The loose notes supplement the map series and should be used with the latter for complete comprehension. They are filed alphabetically by subject. See appendix for list of subjects in this file.

11. PRINTS. Approximately 1500 items. 2 cu. ft.

This portion of the Goff Collection consists of prints of approximately 600 subjects, photographed by Dr. Goff while on his many field trips over the Southeast. Most of the prints are of Georgia subjects, with some of Alabama, and a few of other adjoining states. Prints are arranged by print number with an index card file showing the location of each subject. Card file is arranged alphabetically by subject.

12. LOOSE NOTES, FORTS OF GEORGIA. 1716-circa 1860. 3 1/4 cu. ft.

This file contains a collection of manuscript notes for over 700 forts in Georgia and a few from surrounding states. It was started by Dr. Goff and completed by the staff of the Georgia

Archives. The fort file is a bibliography of source material on Georgia forts, from early Colonial times to circa 1860. There is, in addition, 1/2 cu. ft. of background data on military subjects for the same period. This file should be checked by anyone interested in military history of the Southeast with an emphasis on that of Georgia. The file is arranged alphabetically by names of individual forts.

13. LOOSE NOTES, FERRIES OF GEORGIA. 1799-Present. 1 cu. ft.

The ferry file of the Goff Collection contains approximately 600 references to individual ferries of Georgia. They are, for the most part, typescripts from Dr. Goff's original notes which were destroyed after copying was completed. This file usually contains the name of the ferry, approximate location, and a date of operation. Sometimes the date of authorization by the Crown or state is shown. This file should be checked by anyone researching in the history of ferries in Georgia, although it is incomplete and does not contain the names of all the ferries of that state. The file is arranged alphabetically by names of ferries.
