# Information Specific to the State of Georgia

The Georgia Archives serves as the state archives and records management program. The State Records Committee is the state agency responsible for approving new or revised records retention schedules for state agencies, local government, and the University System of Georgia.

Vital Records (Essential Records) are defined in the Official Code of Georgia Annotated § 50-18-91 (10) "Vital records" means any record vital to the resumption or continuation of operations, or both; to the re-creation of the legal and financial status of government in the state; or to the protection and fulfillment of obligations to citizens of the state.
